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INTRODUCTION

“... there is a spiritual dimension to the disease of addiction that cannot be met by clinical professionals, but only by the spiritual consolation and support that the church can provide.”

This statement, from the [ITHIRST Initiative website](#), captures an essential truth about the disease of addiction. Unlike other diseases, it afflicts one's spiritual as well as physical and mental wellbeing. Perhaps you have seen the popular inspirational quote about cancer (which can apply to most other diseases as well):

“What cancer cannot do: it cannot cripple Love; it cannot shatter Hope; it cannot corrode Faith; it cannot destroy Peace; it cannot kill Friendship; it cannot suppress Memories; it cannot silence Courage; it cannot invade the Soul; it cannot conquer the Spirit.”

Those of us with experience of it know that addiction is likely to inflict ALL of this spiritual harm.

In your ministry, you will give spiritual support and assistance to those you accompany on the path to recovery, and you will also provide resources that can help them access other services, including treatment providers, social services, community-based programs, and housing. This guide will provide a starting point. The information you'll find here has been intentionally limited to mostly institutional organizations because they are some of the most important and reliable resources available. The person seeking help is responsible for treatment choices and all decisions about where to go for treatment or how to proceed. You should make clear to them at the outset that you will not be recommending particular service providers, but rather directing them to information. Your focus is to tend to the important task of their spiritual healing.

It is also important that you, and anyone you accompany on the journey to recovery, understand addiction as a disease and **not** a moral failing. This has been demonstrated scientifically, yet the stigma of addiction persists and can be deadly. As people of faith, we are called to serve and when we know the truth, we can better serve the afflicted. Understanding that addiction is a disease with devastating physical, mental, and spiritual dimensions is crucial to successful recovery. To that end we ask that you familiarize yourself with all the resources in this guide. Look through and visit the websites linked here. We recommend you give special attention to the links in the “NATIONAL Educational” section below. Those you minister to should be directed to read or watch them also.

How to use this guide¹

As we see it, there are two (2) ways to gain knowledge in order to answer a question about a particular topic. The first is by learning all you can about the topic so you will actually know the answer when asked a question. The second is by knowing how to find it.

This guide is set up to help you with the latter form of knowledge – knowing how to find it. In this case, more specifically, knowing how to find addiction treatment and/or recovery services that may be available to assist the person you are accompanying on his or her recovery journey.

So, this guide will start with an example of a site that can help identify the various treatment and recovery services in the nation and state. It is not, however, the only site available, but it is a good example. Then, after this example, we will provide a list of national/federal sites, state sites and Catholic sites with options that can be available anywhere in the country, throughout the entire state, or even as detailed as within a specific city or a defined geographic area.

After looking far and wide, the guide provides local area resources – specifically, those in the Diocese within which you live and serve in this ministry. We will look at diocesan-wide options and multi-county sites as well as county sites – of course, the counties focused on will be the specific counties within the diocese based on the diocesan edition being used. Diocesan parish-based services may also be provided as both service resources as well as examples of ministries to consider developing at your parish.

Information about self-help and peer support group are provided. Suggested reading materials are also presented. Finally, you may want to consider getting additional training and education for which resource opportunities are provided for consideration.

HOW TO FIND ADDICTION AND RECOVERY RESOURCES

~An Example Site Walk Through~

The State of New Jersey Division of Mental Health and Addiction Services (DMHAS) has website that provides a wealth of information. For our purposes, the most important part of the DMHAS website is their [searchable directory](#) to assist in locating programs for alcohol and drug abuse treatment and related services. Here's how to use it - go to*:

- Click on "[Are You Looking for Substance Abuse Treatment?](#)"
- Click on the "[searchable directory.](#)"
- You'll see a screen that asks:
 - What type of treatment are you interested in?
 - Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT)
 - Inpatient Services
 - Outpatient Services
 - Withdrawal Management
 - You can check one or all of the boxes.
- You can then indicate the area to search as:
 - Zip Code/City, State
 - County
 - Provider Name.
- Once you've indicated the treatment and area of interest, hit "Search."
- The search results will appear below the search area. You can even export the search results to a PDF.
- You are also able to reset the search parameters to start over if you need another area of treatment.

AGAIN, the website for DMHAS is a wealth of information. For example, you can see who your [County Drug and Alcohol Director](#) is and how to contact them to inquire about local treatment resources. So, explore it to find more.

Please note the site's appearance may change periodically, but the general search process should be fairly consistent or at least similar.
